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ARE YOU GETTING SUPERFAST BROADBAND?

Essex County Council is running a public consultation during August 2017 to create an updated map of superfast broadband availability in the county. The council will publish an online map showing all Essex premises and their current classification (superfast broadband available or planned/ superfast broadband under review/ no superfast broadband available). Superfast broadband is now defined as a connection offering at least 30Mb download speeds most of the time. When the consultation launches on Monday 31st July, residents and businesses are invited to check their broadband status on the interactive State Aid map available at: www.superfastessex.org/whatshappeningnext.

The Superfast Essex programme team at Essex County Council would like to hear your feedback on the broadband status allocated to your address. This includes feedback confirming the broadband status shown on the map is correct as well as feedback from anyone who disagrees with their current broadband status.

Respondents will be required to provide some evidence to back up any requests to change the status of an address. Details about the type of evidence required and instructions about how to obtain this will be detailed in the public consultation feedback form. Full details about the consultation, including the link to respond, will be available on the same 'What's happening next?' page of the Superfast Essex website: www.superfastessex.org/whatshappeningnext with the interactive State Aid map. Please note the map being consulted on will be used to decide whether properties are eligible for public subsidy in the future. This is different to the interactive rollout map which is separate to this consultation.

The outcome of this consultation will form the basis for directing future investment by



Essex County Council to improve broadband access, with the ambition to ensure everyone in the county has a superfast connection by 2020 at the latest.

Feedback on the consultation must only be submitted via the online public consultation feedback form available on the 'What's happening next?' page at: www.superfastessex.org/whatshappeningnext. Residents in areas with poor connectivity are encouraged to take the time to visit libraries or use workplace computers to complete their feedback, as the team would like to hear from them in particular.

Unfortunately, due to the volume of responses expected and the need to process them quickly, Superfast Essex is unable to offer the option of hard copy correspondence. If you agree with the status of your property as shown on the map (e.g. no superfast broadband available), you do not need to take any further action, however we would welcome your feedback via the public consultation form to confirm the current status shown on the map is correct.

Connie Kerbst, Lead Officer for Superfast Broadband programme at ECC attended our meeting on Wednesday 12th July to discuss concerns raised by residents over the provision of broadband locally. Cllr Strowbridge explained that most of the village has no option of BT broadband. County Broadband had advised they could cover the area of Great Bromley but when requested to install they find they can't. Ms Kerbst advised that ECC needed to disprove County's claim until they can start influencing BT. To do that ECC needed residents to provide evidence, even if it's just verbal evidence stating date and time of call. She also advised that a public consultation would be taking place starting on 31st July 2017, details of which are within this Messenger, along with the type of evidence needed.

News just in! I have received a letter from the Post Office with good news about restoring a service to the village. Subject to a public consultation, they are proposing to offer a service each Wednesday from 10am -12pm at The Cross Inn Public House. The public consultation starts on 14 July and

ends on 25 August, and they plan to open straight after that. You can take part in the public consultation via www.postofficeviews.co.uk and use the reference 08011699, or telephone the Customer Helpline on 03452 660115.

THE BROMLEY CROSS

Great Bromley Village Post Office to Re-open at the Cross Inn

Great news for Great Bromley! We're getting our village Post Office back. It's been closed for over 18 months but on Wednesday 30th August at 10 am Great Bromley Village Post Office will re-open at the Great Bromley Cross. Initially it will only be for 2 hours every Wednesday from 10 am till 12 noon, but if we get enough custom the number of sessions a week will increase. And the pub will be open selling tea, coffee and cake while the post office is open. We hope it can develop into a sort of village drop in centre for post office users or anyone who just fancies a chat with the neighbours over a hot drink. But that's down to you, our customers and our community. And on Wednesday 30th we'll be having a celebration when we open the Post Office to mark this tremendous occasion. Keep an eye out for signs outside the pub, join our Facebook group, "Save The Bromley Cross" or drop us an email at info@greatbromleycross.co.uk for updates.

The new service is called an Outreach Post Office and it works like this: A post master from Wivenhoe will setup the post office every Wednesday morning. It will offer virtually all the services that the Cross Inn Post Office used to provide but for only two hours a week. We realise that this won't meet everyone's needs, but the Post Office business models have moved on since ours closed in October 2015, and that's the best service we can get at the moment.

The services offered include:

- All Royal Mail postal services for home and abroad including signed for and special delivery
- Parcel Force 48 Service
- Health Lottery
- Mobile phone top ups
- Foreign currency to order
- Car Tax
- Fishing Licences

- Bill payments via cash, cheque or debit card
- Banking for most UK banks including cash withdrawals, balances, cash and cheque deposits
- Travel insurance
- Pay Station payments for gas and electricity
- Mail redirections and Keep Safe
- One 4 All gift cards.

If you can wait until Wednesday to use any of these services, then it will be a tremendous help for our village post office, and will lead to the post office opening on more days.

IN THE GARDEN WITH KATE

A couple of days ago, I was lucky enough to see a

Hummingbird Hawk Moth in my garden. I have not seen one for about ten years, and that was a hot

summer too. They are incredibly exotic and beautiful, but not as rare as I initially thought. Apparently they visit the same location every day, so I shall be on the lookout for further sightings.

It has been very hot over the last few days, not quite June levels, but hot nevertheless. I seem to be spending a great deal of time watering tubs, pots and grow bags, but it certainly seems worth it - they are putting on a fantastic display this year. The hot weather seems to have reduced the number of slugs around, and my trusty thrushes are making short work of any snails unwise enough to be visible in their presence. However, there seems to be an explosion of rabbits - we have never had a problem like this before, and the dog spends all his time rushing around with his nose to the ground, trying to track them down (unsuccessfully I have to say!).

August is generally a busy time in the garden. Watering is essential as mentioned before, but feeding will improve displays. Commercial feeds are widely available, applied during watering, but others can be made at home from comfrey, nettles, or even cow dung suspended in and old pair of tights and hung in a water butt.



At this time of year, lavender bushes can be pruned of their flower stems and hung upside down to dry out. It is best to do this in the morning when any dew has dried. Everlasting flowers can also be preserved in the same way. Any flowers that have set seed, and the pods dried can be harvested for sowing next year, bearded iris can be divided, and autumn flowering bulbs planted.

The vegetable garden will need lots of attention, with beans, lettuce, beetroot, turnips courgettes, onions, marrows, calabrese, summer squashes, tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers and aubergine all ready to be harvested. If you have any space in the vegetable garden, early carrots, peas, turnips, lettuce and oriental leaves can be sown. In the fruit cage, gooseberry, currant and summer fruiting raspberries can be pruned.

The butterflies have been spectacular this year, including the dreaded cabbage white, which seems to have found its way under the nets protecting the brassicas! I will have to pull off the caterpillars by hand to stop them munching all the cabbages.

Deadheading is still very important, especially on repeat flowering roses. Despite the lack of rain, the weeds continue to thrive, so regular weeding will allow what moisture there is in the soil to be used by your plants. Mulching may help too after the plant has been well watered.

Semi ripe cuttings can be taken now, especially from lavender and rosemary which root readily in gritty compost if placed around the edge of a pot.

If you are going on holiday this month, have a wonderful time. If not, enjoy your garden!

With 200 staff and 65 people living in its community, Acorn Village is thriving in a lovely 14 acre location in Mistley, near Manningtree, Essex. Michelle Cook, Acorn's Chief Executive came to the Gt. Bromley WI meeting on July 5th to share her vision for Acorn Village and how much the community is looking to the future. Driving forward on the foundation built by Denzil and Phyllis Green in 1972, Acorn Village empowers people with learning disabilities to 'do what they want to do'. Focusing on 'people centred care' each of the 65 village residents is placed at the centre of their own life, living with the people they choose to live with in flats and high-dependency units. Some villagers have lived at Acorn village for over 35 years enjoying their independence in a safe environment.

A registered charity, Acorn Village is funded by social services, fundraising events, legacies, monthly giving, and donations. These enable the village residents to take up hobbies such as horse riding, sailing, fishing, and swimming. It has three charity shops, one in Manningtree, one in Brightlingsea and one on-site at the village. There is also a furniture shop there where you can pick up your next up-cycling project, or another bargain to change the look of your home.

A coffee shop on-site, staffed by village volunteers, enables you to have coffee and cake and have a chat to one of the villagers who will most likely regale you about the CEO and the operations manager getting covered in gunge in June, or invite you to the family dog and classic car show on 5th August. You might even get asked to the 'Acorn's got talent' show on 15th and 16th September.

There is an independent building – the Oakroom - in the grounds of Acorn village which is available to hire for conferences, events and a fabulous dance floor, should you want to hold a party, event or wedding there. A marquee could also be erected if you have too many friends for the venue itself.

Acorn Villages motto – 'life is for living', certainly applies to the village residents and staff who make this vibrant community so engaging and safe for its residents. Come along to one of its many events, pop in if you are passing, have a look at the craft centre, the charity shop, or buy a new project from the furniture shop. Sit in the garden with a cuppa and a sweet treat, enjoy the views, and know that you are making a difference to people's lives by your contributions. Acorn Village is well worth a visit.

FRIENDSHIP CLUB

The June meeting began with various ideas being discussed for the annual outing. Date and destination to be announced. Members were asked to suggest a hymn to be included in the "Songs of Praise" at the church on Sunday 2nd July during the Flower Festival weekend. Our suggestions were included in the service which was well supported by our Club.

Our Speaker for the afternoon, Maralyn Bambridge, was then introduced. Maralyn

told us of her continuing work raising money and changing lives of Rwandan orphans and the opening of the Maternity Unit in Ntunga. She had many items made by the local people which were on sale, the proceeds of which will go towards more equipment for their development.

The August meeting will be the annual auction. No raffle or stalls for that month.

JABEZ HENRY SPRAGGONS (1891 – 1917)

Jabez Spraggon and his twin brother Robert were born in Great Bromley – probably at the family home on Back Road, Hare Green - in the summer of 1891. The twins were the youngest of Alfred and Eliza Spraggon's six children, though the only other boy had died as a baby.

Alfred Spraggon (originally from Waldringfield, near Sudbury) was an agricultural labourer, and had married Eliza Taylor from Elmstead Market in 1879. For the first years of their marriage they lived in Elmstead, which was where Jabez's three sisters were born, before moving to Great Bromley sometime after 1886.

After leaving school, Jabez was employed as a Farm Labourer and remained living at Hare Green after his father's death in 1909, along with his mother, brother and eldest sister.

In early 1912, Jabez joined the Essex Regiment. He may well have been posted overseas for garrison duty in India, and later Mauritius, before being recalled to the UK in late 1914.

Jabez and his Battalion, the 1st Essex, were among the first Allied troops to land on the Gallipoli peninsula in April 1915. Jabez was wounded in the first weeks of the campaign, but re-joined the 1st Essex, almost certainly before they left Gallipoli in January 1916 as part of the Allied withdrawal. The 1st Essex were sent to France in late March of 1916, and in the next year and a half took part in the Battle of the Somme, the Battle of Arras and the Third Battle of Ypres.

We do not know when Jabez was wounded for a second time, but it seems likely to have occurred on 10th August 1917 near the village of Pilkem, just north of Ypres. The Battalion were subjected to heavy shelling whilst on trench duty in the support line, though the War Diary records that they suffered very few casualties.



Jabez was evacuated to a Casualty Clearing Station (CCS) just north of the town of Poperinge in Belgium, and approximately 18 miles behind the front line. This was the second of three CCS that had been humorously nicknamed by the British soldiers as Mendinghem, Dozinghem and Bandaghem.

Jabez died of his wounds on 16th August 1917, and was buried in the adjacent Dozinghem Military Cemetery. It is the last resting place of over 3,000 Commonwealth war dead, most of them from the Great War.

Note: Jabez Henry Spraggon is the name under which Jabez's birth was registered, and the name he used when joining the Army in 1912. This contrasts with the names GH Spraggon, and George Spraggon, under which he is commemorated on Great Bromley's War Memorials. Does anyone know why? His sisters were all registered at birth as Spraggon! We would be very grateful to make contact with any Spraggon (or Spraggon) relatives.

THE DOCTORS' SURGERY NEWS

Great Bentley Surgery



The Government via NHS England is actively trying to get surgeries to work together and in some parts of the country, huge areas have seen dozens of practices come together in what's called 'Super-Partnerships'. Invariably this has always resulted in many mergers, with some smaller practices being swallowed up and patients having to travel further to see a GP and continuity of care being affected as a result. NHS England have also made it very clear that smaller practices like ours are not the future and that organisations with 30,000 to 50,000 patients are preferred. As such many existing and new contracts will only be made available to these larger practices which could affect the financial viability of those left behind.

Here at Great Bentley Surgery, we know our patients value the continuity of care and the personal touch we are able to provide given our smaller size. We have always been very mindful of wanting to keep this whilst planning to protect the surgery's future here in Great Bentley Village.

However, we also need to be in a position that we do not miss out on any future opportunities due to being small, which could result in the practice becoming financially unviable. For the last 6 months, we have been talking to a small group of like-minded practices spread around North East Essex to create an organisation. The single most important factor for us all is to keep our identity and autonomy so we can always make decisions based on what's best for the surgery and our patients, but not miss out of any opportunities ahead.

We've now created a Limited Liability Partnership with 5 other practices, so that we have 3 in Tendring and 3 in Colchester. This gives us an excellent coverage of the area and will allow us to potentially provide more services and share resources. The aim is for this to secure all of our futures for

our patients and the new group is called the North East Essex GP Network. We even have a basic website already which you can view at www.NEEGPNetwork.com and our logo is to the right.



Mobile phones

We are seeing an increased use of mobile phones DURING consultations with our health care assistants, nurses and doctors.



Whilst we are happy for mobile phones to be used in the waiting room, using them in consultations is completely inappropriate. We hear stories of phones being answered and parents asking to speak to

a nurse again as they were not listening to the advice given to their child as they were too busy on their phone. This not only wastes our precious time, but is extremely rude!

THE HUMAN MICROBIOME

What is it?

The human microbiome is the collection of bacteria living in and on our body. It consists of about 100 trillion bacterial cells. This is 10 times more cells than the number of human cells in the body! The gut's bacterial population weighs in at around 2kg. And most of it, 99% are found in the gut.

We all know that there are bacteria all around us. Often we think that bacteria are bad and must be eliminated at all cost from everywhere; be it by the use of antibacterial hand soaps, antibacterial wipes and a multitude of other antibacterial products for floors, kitchen tops, bathrooms etc. This is what the manufacturers of these products want you to believe. In fact the use of vinegar, salt and hot water mixture is an age-old answer for the prevention of bacterial contamination around the home, especially in the kitchen.

We are slowly beginning to realise that the vast majority of bacteria that reside on, or in our bodies (the microbiome) are harmless and even helpful. The bacteria living on our hands, for instance, will protect us from invading bad bacteria, so using an antibacterial soap that will kill 99.9% of bacteria may not be such a good thing after all. Ordinary soap and water or liquid soap without the antibacterial will do just fine.

A recent paper¹ published in the Journal of Clinical Investigation from New York University tells us: *'The composition of the microbiome and its activities are involved in most, if not all of the biological processes that constitute human health and disease, as we proceed through our life cycle.'* Although much evidence about the importance of our gut health has been in existence for many years, much of it has been ignored. It has now been established that it is absolutely essential to take care of it from birth to old age. 10 years ago scientists were only just beginning to

explore the depths of the human gut. The results are outstanding. It's never too late to start looking after your gut.

So what do we need to do? It's pretty simple – start eating foods that will stimulate the many different species of gut bacteria. They need feeding, just like you do. In a nutshell, our diet should be varied. We need to eat lots of different vegetables, preferably locally grown. Eat butter, not margarine spreads. Drink full fat milk, organic is best. Eat meat in moderation, that means not every day and give preference to fish, followed by white meat (chicken). Drink plenty of filtered water, snack on nuts and seeds and don't buy processed 'food'. Also introduce fermented products into your diet. They are of great benefit to your gut. These include full fat natural organic yoghurt, Kefir drink and sauerkraut made from white cabbage. I am planning to run a sauerkraut/Kefir workshop on 12th August from 10:30 – 3:30 @ £50 per person including refreshments, lunch, handouts, a Kefir starter and a jar for the sauerkraut. Places are limited to 10, so please contact me via my website to book your place.

BECKY'S BUTCHERS

After a very hot few weeks during June/ July our pigs have been enjoying a daily water bath to roll in. Being able to wallow allows them to cover their



skin in mud to protect from burning as well as keep their body temperatures down. We have been lucky to get some rain to help the crops grow prior to harvest and also our grass fields, where our livestock roam.

After a very hot and successful Tendring Hundred Show, harvest is now in full swing. You will have seen and heard many combines going till late into the night. At Badley Hall Farm we have started the winter barley fields and will soon be moving onto our winter wheat followed by bean fields.

Are you able to tell the difference between wheat and barley? Well wheat is slightly darker in colour to barley. There are different groups of wheat, group 1,2 and 3

are produced for human consumption including bread, pasta, cake and biscuits. Group 4 wheats are produced for animal feed.

Barley has a similar seed head as wheat does, except the awns or "beard" of the head is much longer than wheat, and the head itself is not as coarse. Barley can also be very itchy if come into contact with it. Barley is mainly grown as animal feed but is also used for human consumption in breads and soups as well as beer.

It is also a busy time in the butchery with spring lamb now readily available as half or as individual cuts. We have also been experimenting with our own bacon, including smoking!

FROM THE RECTORY

French military leader and statesman Charles de Gaulle was a man with a good grasp of attempting the impossible. While serving as President of France he asked the presumably rhetorical question 'How can you govern a country which has two hundred and forty-six varieties of cheese?' Understandably, he didn't attempt an answer.

De Gaulle understood the impossible. Others less so. William Thomson, 1st Baron Kelvin was a hugely successful mathematical physicist, engineer and inventor. Among other things he was knighted for his work on a transatlantic telegraph cable, he determined the lower limit of absolute temperature, and had had the scale of temperature measurements named in his honour. He wasn't always right though. In 1895 he declared that 'heavier than air flying machines are impossible. It was just eight years later that he was shown to be completely and utterly wrong.

The history of mankind is littered with some spectacular achievements that undoubtedly started out looking not just impractical, but completely out of the question. The first attempts, glorious failures and partial victories that make up the road to success often go unnoticed, as it's only the final triumphant success that gets credit. And then the previously unthinkable becomes

feasible, and what was impossible is not just possible, but a part of everyday life.

The bible tells us about a conversation that Jesus had with a wealthy young man who wanted to know how he might get eternal life. The culmination of their discussion sees the young man walk away when it all seems too hard, and then Jesus tells his disciples, 'it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.'

As wealth was seen as a blessing from God, who then could be saved?

Jesus tells us. "All things are possible with God."

From the greatest to the least, we are all welcomed by God. He doesn't see the colour of our hair or skin, our width or our height. He doesn't see our wealth or lack of it. With the life that faith in Jesus Christ offers, God just sees possibilities.
